In the English language, there are two ways of conveying what someone else has said: direct/quoted speech and indirect/ reported speech. Direct Speech, Direct/quoted speech, involves quoting the exact words uttered by the person, within inverted commas or quotation marks. Direct speech examples:

Direct and Indirect Speech - English Grammar
 Some of the most basic and important English grammar rules relate directly to sentence structure. These rules specify that: A singular subject needs a singular predicate. A sentence needs to express a complete thought. Another term for a sentence is an independent clause. Clauses, like any sentence, have a subject and predicate too.

 If the reporting verb is in the Past Tense, as is most common, then the tense of the direct speech i.e. the tense of verbs contained within the speech marks and as actually spoken, will backshift when converting from direct speech into indirect speech. 1. DIRECT SPEECH IN THE PRESENT TENSES

 Direct and indirect objects - Easy Learning Grammar. The object of a sentence (if there is one) normally comes after the verb phrase. Whether there is an object or not depends on the meaning of the verb. For example, if you want to talk about what someone is doing, you might say ' She is writing ' but if you want to talk about the point of the activity, you might say, ' She is writing a book ' .

 Direct speech repeats, or quotes, the exact words spoken. When we use direct speech in writing, we place the words spoken between quotation marks (" ") and there is no change in these words. We may be reporting something that's being said NOW (for example a telephone conversation), or telling someone later about a previous conversation.
